Comparative & Superlative Adjectives

Part 1: What Are They?

- Comparative Adjectives: Used to compare two things or people.
- They often end in -er or use the word "more."
- Formula: Noun (subject) + verb + comparative adjective + than + noun (object).
- o Example: An elephant is **bigger than** a mouse.
- o Example: This painting is **more beautiful than** that one.
- **Superlative Adjectives:** Used to compare **three or more** things or people. They describe the highest or lowest degree.
- They often end in -est or use the word "most."
- They are almost always preceded by "the."
- Formula: Noun + verb + the + superlative adjective.
- o Example: An elephant is **the biggest** land animal.
- o Example: This is **the most beautiful** painting in the gallery.
